

A New Season

A new bowls season is under way. Under the new way of thinking it is just one long season - seamless, there's no start and no end. I've been reading a bit of club history. In the 1930's and 40's the club was not usually able to open the one natural green until mid October and usually closed again by mid April - a six month season. Even when I started playing here around 2000 if the spring was wet we couldn't usually start until at least mid September, and often it was playing on scrims for a few weeks. Then when the Astrograss green was installed a much longer season was possible and the economics of running a large club suddenly improved. No longer did our premises sit idle for a long period, the bar and kitchen generated more profit, and we were able to accumulate a much larger surplus to be reinvested in our facilities.

And so the next stage is here and it will be up to our club's Executive to maximise the possibilities of having two greens available twelve months of the year. We will need to explore the ways clubs such as Waikanae and Raumati use their resources. The club is totally unrecognisable from what it was in 2000. The 10 Year Plan will continue to evolve the club.

The First New Season's Championships

The Men's and Women's Balloted Triples were the first of the new season's championships to be decided over the weekend 8 - 9 September followed by the Men's and Women's Balloted $2 \times 4 \times 2$ Pairs. The size of the fields were disappointing - seven men's triples, six women's triples and then eleven for the Mixed Balloted Triples.

The idea of scheduling the balloted events at the beginning of the season is primarily to get any new members and our less experienced members to de able to interact on the green and later socially with our established members in events where they can enter and, by the luck of the draw, get teamed up with some of our top players, and, perhaps win a club title. But this did not happen this time as only 21 men and 18 women (a total of only 39 of our 108 members) took part in the men's and women's triples, and only 33 in the mixed event.

Perhaps it is time to rethink these events as our programme is so crowded that it would be good to eliminate events which prove unpopular, or maybe schedule them mid-week as we did a couple of seasons back, or spread them throughout the season. After all most Tuesdays we get more than 33 players on the green for roll up. Or, am I wrong? Maybe its just too much bowls as a result of a very full winter programme? Or is it the usual terrible weather in September? Whatever is the case we need to take another look at these events.

New Zealand's First Champion Bowler - William Carswell

We've heard of the feats of the great New Zealand players of the modern era who have won a lot of national titles - Nick Unkovich, Gary Lawson, Rowan Brassey, Peter Belliss - there is quite a long list. But very few are probably aware of the record of our first champion William Carswell of the Taieri club in Dunedin.

William Carswell won 13 national titles over a period of 46 years, between 1888 and 1934. For ten years during that period he gave the sport away to concentrate on his other interests, greyhound racing and playing draughts. He was one the best in the country at draughts.

At the 1899 nationals he won the singles and pairs and was runner up in the fours. Apparently the last time he took part in the nationals in 1941 at the ago of 80 he was still a force to be reckoned with. He was the winner of the Taieri club's singles 12 times and two Dunedin's champion-of-champions winner.

His national titles:

Singles	1892,1899,1924, 1934

Pairs: 1892, 1899, 1902

Fours: 1888, 1891, 1902, 1907, 1908, 1922

Carswell received a lot of favourable mentions when a national team to tour Australia was being selected in 1906 but he does not appear in the team photo. Who knows why?

So, Your Bowls Have a Bias!

Lawn bowls have not always had a bias. The first 'bowls' in various parts of the world were really shaped stone discs. Games were played with these primitive discs being rolled towards some sort of target in a number of parts of the world. The first were probably in Egypt about 7,000 years ago. From there the game was picked up by the Greeks and Romans (Italy still has a form of bowls called 'bocci') and it was probably the Romans who brought the game to England.

Similar games were played in the Aztec Empire in Central America, by Native Americans, in China and closer to us in Polynesia. Captain Cook wrote about playing a game in Hawaii where the 'bowls' "were about 3 to 4 inches in diameter and about one inch across at the edges, but thicker in the centre and rounded very exactly." In New Zealand Elsdon Best found similar stone discs on the beach in Tauranga, larger than those in Hawaii, and believed that early Maori played a similar game.

Back in England the early bowls were made of wood - yew, holly, oak, ash or boxwood, and were completely round. It was not until 1552 that the first bowl with a bias was used. The story goes that Charles Brandon, Duke of Suffolk, was playing when he split one of his wooden bowls. Needing a replacement he went indoors and sawed off the round ornamental cap on a banister. Taking it back to the green he found that it would only take a curved path to the kitty which enabled him to 'draw' around the various obstructions in his way. From then on biased bowls were developed.
